## A BILL

## **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Ensuring Airline Resil-
- 5 iency to Reduce Delays and Cancellations Act".

## 1 SEC. 2. AIRLINE OPERATIONAL RESILIENCY PLANS.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the 3 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Transpor-4 tation shall require a covered carrier to develop and regu-5 larly update an operational resiliency strategy to prevent 6 or limit the impact of future flight disruptions on pas-7 sengers.

8 (b) OPERATIONAL RESILIENCY STRATEGY.—In each
9 operational resiliency strategy developed under subsection
10 (a), a covered carrier shall include a description of—

(1) the potential impact of severe weather and
other reasonably anticipated disruptive events on the
operations of the carrier and how the carrier seeks
to prevent or limit the impact of such events on passengers;

16 (2) the potential impact of severe weather
17 events and other reasonably anticipated disruptive
18 events on—

19 (A) staffing models and the preparedness
20 of the current workforce of the carrier to ad21 dress such conditions; and

(B) the current information and technology
systems of the carrier, including crew scheduling systems, and the preparedness of such
systems to continue operations after such an
event or disruption;

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1 (3) the preparedness of the carrier to maintain 2 operations and limit or prevent the impact of other 3 potential disruptive events identified by the carrier; 4 (4) the extent to which the carrier addresses 5 known cybersecurity risks and information tech-6 nology deficiencies and vulnerabilities to prevent po-7 tential flight disruptions; and 8 (5) any other issues the Secretary determines 9 appropriate to protect consumers and maintain the 10 operational stability of the airline industry. 11 (c) **PROPRIETARY** INFORMATION.—The Secretary 12 shall develop a method to protect the confidentiality of any 13 trade secret or proprietary information submitted in an 14 operational resiliency strategy under subsection (b). 15 (d) EVALUATION.— 16 (1) AUDIT.—Not later than 3 years after the 17 date of enactment of this Act, the Comptroller Gen-18 eral of the United States shall initiate an audit to 19 evaluate the effectiveness of the operational resil-20 iency strategies developed under this section by cov-21 ered air carriers. 22 (2) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after com-23 pletion of the audit conducted under paragraph (1), 24 the Comptroller General shall submit to the Com-25 mittee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the

House of Representatives and the Committee on
 Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Sen ate a report on the findings of the audit.

4 (e) COVERED CARRIER.—In this section, the term
5 "covered carrier" has the meaning given such term in sec6 tion 259.3 of title 14, Code of Federal Regulations (or
7 successor regulations).
